

PANDEMIC (H1N1) 2009 INFLUENZA (HUMAN SWINE INFLUENZA) VACCINATION UPDATE # 7: 21 January 2010

Key points

1. Please encourage Panvax® vaccination for all your patients >6 months of age, especially those at increased risk for severe disease.
2. Pandemic (H1N1) 2009 influenza activity remains high overseas – it is likely to cause another severe season in Australia in 2010.
3. Children aged 0-4 years had the highest rate of hospitalisation from pandemic influenza in 2009.

Global situation

- Pandemic (H1N1) 2009 influenza remains highly active in many parts of the world and is the predominant influenza strain.
- Even regions that had high levels of disease activity in April-May 2009 had significant surges in activity in November-December 2009.
- The disease does not appear to have changed significantly over time: younger age groups are disproportionately affected compared with usual seasonal influenza pattern.
- In 2009, children aged 0-4 years experienced the highest rates of hospitalisation of any age group in NSW. Only 50% of those hospitalised had pre-existing conditions.

What can GPs do?

Because of the possibility of another severe influenza season in 2010, it is essential that we increase uptake of the pandemic influenza vaccine now.

I encourage you to examine ways you can strongly promote vaccine uptake among your patients. You could consider:

- Setting up additional immunisation clinics;
- Posting signage encouraging vaccination (available from the below website); and
- Contacting patients at increased risk (small children and their carers, those with chronic medical conditions, Aboriginal patients and pregnant women) and encouraging vaccination.
